### GROWING AND SHARING

2023 was an exciting year for Colorado WaterWise (CWW). We brought in six new board members, making our organization even more diverse. With the addition of these fantastic people, our board is now 19 strong!

At a high level, we were able to continue projects and add new initiatives such as:

- Adding a new DEI committee to the organization. The committee will work to provide guidance, support, resources, and recommendations to CWW staff, board, and committees on including diversity, equity, inclusion, justice, and anti-racism practices into Colorado WaterWise events, initiatives, and educational material.
- Continued work on the 2024 <u>Guidebook of Best Practices for Municipal Water</u> <u>Conservation in Colorado</u>. Originally published in 2010, the new guidebook will be available both in a user-friendly PDF and an online webpage. Keep an eye out in 2024 for the final product!
- Our Educational Events Committee hosted a handful of free webinars and inperson events in 2023 designed to keep you in the know on a variety of relevant water-related topics.
- CWW hosted its Annual Symposium on October 24, 2023, with nearly 150 attendees! We heard from some amazing presenters and loved seeing so many new and returning faces.
- LLYLI once again produced new material for our members, including new social media posts for artificial turf, an HOA toolkit, and all new infographics. Watch for new material coming in 2024.


### 2023 PROGRAMS DATA AND TOOLS

In 2023, the momentum of the Best Practice (BP) Guidebook Update continued. The project team, consisting of WaterDM, Brendle Group, and INTERA, undertook a series of stakeholder meetings from March to December. These meetings, totaling six (four online and two in-person), were designed to ensure a comprehensive and inclusive update, addressing key elements such as guidebook organization, input on best practices, supporting resources, and case study identification.

The success of these meetings was evident, with over 90% of respondents rating them as "Very Good" or "Excellent."

By May 2023, the project team had consolidated the diverse stakeholder input into specific Best Practices categories. Recognizing the significance of outdoor water use, a fifth stakeholder meeting in July 2023 was centered around this theme, attracting nearly 100 participants.

The seven best practice categories to be included in the guidebook are:



### 2023 PROGRAMS DATA AND TOOLS

Each best practice is structured similarly with a clear definition and includes:

- Summary of major benefits.
- Regulatory requirements.
- Key concepts/steps.
- Costs and benefits.
- Examples and case studies.
- Resources.
- Cost-effectiveness considerations.

In December 2023, the sixth and final stakeholder meeting was held with over 60 attendees who provided valuable insights to help guide the project team forward and fill in the gaps.

The collaborative approach employed by the team, both in-person and online, underscored a commitment to inclusivity and a dedication to gathering diverse perspectives. Looking ahead, the team is working to integrate the gathered insights into the updated guidebook, set for release in the fall/winter of 2024. This ensures that the guidebook reflects both stakeholder perspectives and the latest best practices and technologies in water conservation.


